Board of Nursing Statement of Philosophy

It is the philosophy of the Kentucky Board of Nursing that the regulation of the practice of nursing shall achieve public protection by ensuring the competency of licensees who provide nursing care. To that end, the regulation of nursing should be responsive to the changing health application of knowledge, skills, and behavior to meet those needs and priorities. As public protection is the essential role of the Board, the public should have a voice in the action taken to promote its protection.

Licensure establishes an essential level of competency, and indicates that nurses have a common core of knowledge. As such, the purpose of licensure is to set standards for practice and education of individuals in order to protect the public from dishonest and incompetent practitioners. These standards are established in the *Kentucky Nursing Laws* (Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 314) and its attendant administrative regulations. Nursing practice and behavior inconsistent with these standards should lead to disciplinary action.

Critical elements of the regulation of nursing practice include a coherent, generally acceptable definition of nursing, as well as definitions of professional scope and accountability. These definitions should make explicit that the nurse is responsible and accountable for the practice of nursing according to individual preparation and experience, with nursing auxiliaries assisting under prescribed conditions. Further, the licensed nurse is responsible and accountable for continued professional learning throughout her/his career continuum.

Essential components of the regulation of prelicensure nursing education include sufficient, qualified faculty and appropriate program curricula and clinical practice laboratories. The curricula should reflect the activities, functions, duties, and responsibilities of the practicing nurse. The clinical practice laboratories should allow prelicensure students opportunities to both generate new knowledge and demonstrate their practice abilities.


As the standards governing nursing practice, continuing education, and prelicensure education are established through the legislative process, the Board has a responsibility to maintain ongoing communication with the legislative branch of government. Concurrently, the complex and dynamic changes occurring in the health care delivery system require that effective communication be maintained with licensees and with local, state and national nursing organizations, health care providers and agencies, governmental units, and nursing education programs.

In summary, the Kentucky Board of Nursing believes that the protection of the public can best be accomplished through ensuring the competency of licensees who provide nursing care, and by establishing standards that allow for the fullest development of nursing practice, commensurate with its potential social contribution.

Highlights of Board Activities

This Annual Report provides a synopsis of the various activities conducted by this agency to fulfill its charge to regulate the practice of nursing in order to protect and safeguard the health and safety of the citizens of the Commonwealth of Kentucky [Reference: KRS 314.021(1)].

Highlights of this years' activities are listed below.

- ◆ Development of a participatory strategic planning model that resulted in revised mission, values, and vision statements.
- ◆ Initial implementation of new statutorily created programs including:
 - Establishment of the Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner Advisory Council and statewide certification program.
 - Establishment of guidelines for domestic violence continuing education offerings.
 - Entry into a contractual agreement that provides peer assistance for impaired nurses.
 - Promulgation of an administrative regulation governing advanced registered nurse practitioner prescription authority.
- ◆ Implementation of statutory changes to the Nursing Incentive Scholarship Program that facilitated an increase in the number of scholarships awarded.
- ◆ Approval of a working position paper entitled "Accountability and Responsibility of Licensees to Assure Competency," and subsequent hosting of open forums to address related regulatory issues.
- ◆ Establishment of nurse administrator's educational program offerings presented by the Board members and staff.
- ◆ Initiation of work process improvement activities to increase efficiency and utilization of enhanced computerization and imaging technology.
- ◆ Enhancement of an automated nurse licensure verification system for verification of nurse licensure status.

The **Study and Planning Committee** considers those matters related to the needs of the Board and its operation for enhancement of monitoring statutory and regulatory compliance and in planning for the predictable future.

The *Kentucky Nursing Laws* are contained in *Kentucky Revised Statutes Chapter 314*. During its 1996 session, the General Assembly enacted several revisions to the laws. Effective July 1996, these revisions are as follows:

House Bill 363 (1996 Acts Chapter 26) amended several provisions of *KRS Chapter 314*.

- .025 Changes made to the Nursing Incentive Scholarship Fund program.
- .026 Changes made to the Nursing Incentive Scholarship Fund committee and to the program.
- .027 Changes made to the Nursing Incentive Scholarship Fund program.
- .091 Adds provision clarifying that action can be taken against a nurse for violating previous order of the Board.
- .121 Adds a member to the Board. Deletes the Advisory Council.
- .131 Adds president-elect to the officers of the Board.
- .171 Establishes the Impaired Nurses Committee of the Board.
- .193 Changes the composition of the ARNP Council.

House Bill 495 (1996 Acts Chapter 260) created the Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner, the Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner Advisory Council, and authorized the Board to promulgate regulations to implement the Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner Program.

Senate Bill 292 (1996 Acts Chapter 318) amended the uniform hearing procedure provisions of *KRS 13B* and amended *KRS Chapter 314* to conform.

House Bill 358 (1996 Acts Chapter 342) authorized ARNPs to prescribe nonscheduled legend drugs if they have a collaborative practice agreement with a physician.

Kentucky Administrative Regulations are enacted to operationalize statutory language and carry force and effect of law. Several regulations were revised during FY 96-97 as indicated by the effective date.

Continuing Education

As a mechanism to promote continuing competency, the *Kentucky Nursing Laws* (KRS 314.073) mandate that licensees earn a minimum of 30 hours of approved nursing continuing education, including at least two hours of Kentucky Cabinet for Human Resources (CHR) approved AIDS education (KRS 214.610). The Kentucky Board of Nursing (KBN) is the Commonwealth agency legally authorized to approve providers of mandatory continuing education (CE).

In 1996, the Kentucky General Assembly mandated that all nurses with active licensure status on July 15, 1996 must earn three hours of KBN approved Domestic Violence CE before July 1, 1999. This is a one-time earning requirement. Any nurse licensed after July 15, 1996 has three years from the date of initial licensure to earn the one-time three hours of Domestic Violence CE. Compliance monitoring will include random audits following renewals in 1999.

The post-renewal audit process is used to verify earning of the required 30 contact hours including the two hours of CHR approved AIDS education. The random audit requires that those persons selected show documented evidence (certificate of attendance, transcript, grade report, etc.) of approved contact hour earning during the

applicable licensure period. Of those licensees randomly selected for the audit process, 99% demonstrated compliance with the CE requirements. Those not complying were referred for disciplinary action.



FY 96-97: TOTAL OPERATING FUND = \$4,451,857



The Kentucky Board of Nursing is a fee supported agency. No general revenue tax dollars are expended by the agency. The operating fund for FY 96-97 was \$4,451,857 with expenditures totaling \$2,145,367. Due to biennial licensure of nurses, funds from carry forward (balance) are needed to meet the FY 98 budget.

Various Board of Nursing publications and informational material were offered for a nominal fee that covered duplicating costs. Some of the publications available for purchase were the KBN History, *Kentucky Nursing Laws*, KBN Administrative Regulations, KBN Advisory Opinion Statements, and Disciplinary Process and Procedures for Nursing Licensure. A free brochure on continuing education was also available.


The *Kentucky Nursing Laws* provide that the Board of Nursing may "deny, limit, revoke, probate or suspend any license to practice nursing issued by the Board or applied for . . . or to otherwise discipline a licensee or to deny admission to the licensure examination, or to require evidence of evaluation and therapy"

The Board continues its efforts to make the public aware of the investigatory and disciplinary procedures and to emphasize the legal requirement to, and importance of, reporting nurses who are suspected of engaging in unsafe or illegal practices.

DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS COMPARATIVE SUMMARY FY 92-97



The Board interprets the legal scope of nursing practice according to the *Kentucky Nursing Laws* and Board of Nursing administrative regulations in the determination of safe and effective nursing care for the citizens of the Commonwealth. In response to inquiries requesting interpretation of the legal scope of nursing practice, the Board has published formal advisory opinion statements as guidelines for safe practice (see the chart at right), as well as issuing other opinions on nursing practice matters.

During FY 96-97, the Board addressed the following inquiries regarding nursing practice: Performance of long pulsed dye laser therapy by nurses; performance of transcutaneous nerve stimulation by licensed practical nurses; performance of flexible sigmoidoscopy for colorectal cancer screening by nurses; removal of temporary epicardial pacing wires by registered nurses; and research proposal - monitoring patient responses to ketamine hydrochloride for post surgical pain management by registered nurses.

Nursing Incentive Scholarship Fund

The Nursing Incentive Scholarship Fund (NISF) provides scholarships to Kentucky residents who will be attending approved prelicensure nursing programs (registered nurse or practical nurse) or graduate nursing programs. The scholarship requires that a recipient must work as a nurse in Kentucky for one year for each academic year funded. To be eligible for consideration, an applicant must already be admitted to a nursing program.

Students in prelicensure and BSN completion nursing programs must complete a minimum of eight (8) credit hours per semester of published requirements for the nursing program, and maintain a minimum grade point average which will allow continuation in the nursing program. For graduate nursing programs, students must complete a minimum of six (6) credit hours per semester of published requirements for the nursing program, and maintain a grade point average which will allow continuation in the graduate program.

NCLEX Pass Rates

With the April 1994 implementation of computer adaptive technology, eligible licensure candidates schedule the NCLEX examination at a time of personal preference, within one year of being declared eligible to test by the Board.

Since NCLEX testing is on a demand basis, the reporting of pass rates for first-time candidates by programs of nursing is based upon the numbers of graduates from a program of nursing during a fiscal year (i.e., July 1 through June 30) who test prior to December 31 of the subsequent fiscal year.

Prelicensure Programs of Nursing

The Kentucky Board of Nursing is the legally authorized body in the Commonwealth to approve programs of nursing preparing persons for eligibility for licensure as nurses. Through the provisions of the *Kentucky Nursing Laws* (KRS 314.011, 314.031, 314.111 and 314.131) and applicable *Kentucky Administrative Regulations* (201 KAR 20:250-360), the Board prescribes standards for educational institutions offering programs preparing candidates for licensure as nurses.

All programs of nursing listed on the three previous pages have full approval status except for the following programs which have initial or conditional approval status, as noted.






ARNP Registrations

Since 1978, *Kentucky Revised Statutes* 314.131(1) empower the Board to register and designate those persons qualified to engage in advanced nursing practice. KRS 314.011(6) and (7) define "advanced registered nurse practitioner" and "advanced registered nursing practice," respectively. The Kentucky Board of Nursing registers qualified individuals as advanced registered nurse practitioners (ARNP) designated either as nurse anesthetist, nurse-midwife, nurse practitioner, or nurse clinical specialist.

ADVANCED REGISTERED NURSE PRACTITIONER REGISTRATIONS CUMULATIVE AND NEW: FY 96-97






